How can I submit data to improve my HEDIS® scores?

Administrative claims

- Submit claim/encounter data for each service rendered with appropriate billing codes
- Submit applicable codes when members should be excluded from HEDIS measures
- Accurate and timely submission of claims data is the most appropriate way to ensure all services are captured and accounted for

Supplemental Data

EDI Feeds

- Partner with our Supplemental Data team to get an Electronic Data Interchange (EDI) feed set up. This electronic method of data submission moves information directly from one computer application to another in a standard electronic format

EMR Access



Well Child Visit Tips



- Well-care visits can be completed via telehealth.
- When a child is in your office for a sick visit or back to school/sports physical, you can also conduct a well-child visit if appropriate. Simply add the modifier 25 to the sick visit or physical visit and bill for the appropriate well-visit.
- Screening for obesity should occur at these visits by calculating a child's Body Mass Index (BMI) percentile for gender and age or plotting the value on a growth curve.
- Schedule next appointment at close of visit and offer flexible appointment availability including evening, weekends, telehealth, and family appointments.
- While a patient is in your office for a well-child visit, be sure to administer required vaccinations and testing. If vaccines are not available in your office at the time of the visit, provide contact information for local health departments or other vaccine providers to prevent patients falling on recommended vaccines.

**(WCC) Weight Assessment and Counseling for Nutrition and Physical Activity for Children/ Adolescents**

- This measure couples well with well-child visits. Both measures will benefit from one visit. Please ensure correct coding when billing for both measures
- Utilize sick visits and sports physicals to also complete this measure. Include and document all three measure components during a sick visit for a compliant WCC record
- When counseling for nutrition, discuss appropriate food intake, healthy eating habits, issues including body image and eating disorders, etc.
- When counseling for physical activity, discuss organized sports, activities, and document age-appropriate activity such as “rides bike for 30 minutes a day”

**(APM) Metabolic Monitoring for Children and Adolescents on Antipsychotics**

- Offer lab testing on-site or support lab scheduling at accessible in-network facility during patient visits and have referrals easily accessible or standing orders

**(ADD) Follow-Up Care for Children Prescribed ADHD**

- Schedule two or more visits in the nine months after the initial follow-up visit to continue to monitor your patient’s progress
- Write prescriptions for 30 days or less to encourage follow-up to assess treatment regimen
- Offer flexible appointment availability including evening, weekends, and telehealth options

**(LSC) Lead Screening in Children**

- Offer testing on-site or support scheduling at accessible in-network facility during patient visits and have referrals easily accessible or standing orders.
- Enter lead screening results in the Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR)
- Reach out to your Quality or Provider Network Management Representative to find out about Point of Care Lead Analyzers for your office

**(IMA) Immunizations for Adolescents (CIS) Childhood Immunization Status**

- Try to complete immunizations at scheduled well-exams to reduce the number of appointments
- Offer immunizations on-site or support scheduling at accessible in-network facility during patient visit and have referrals easily accessible or standing orders
- Educate patients and parents/guardians on the diseases that are prevented with immunizations
- Address concerns and fears that parents may have regarding vaccinations.
- Enter all completed immunizations into MCIR.

Vaccines are Safe and Effective

Getting your child vaccinated helps protect them from serious childhood diseases. You can protect your child against 14 serious diseases, such as measles and whooping cough (pertussis), by staying up to date on your child's vaccines. Vaccines are always tested to make sure they are safe. Vaccines work best when kids get their shots at the right ages.




Community Health Workers

Medicaid Redeterminations

What is Medicaid Redetermination?

Medicaid redetermination is the process that states use to ensure that Medicaid enrollees continue to be eligible for Medicaid coverage. Typically, redetermination happens once a year; however, the rules changed during the pandemic. During the COVID-19 public health emergency, the federal government paused Medicaid redetermination. Renewals were not required during this time, and enrollees could not lose their health coverage.

Why is This Happening Now?

Due to a proposal in the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 passed by Congress, states may resume the process of redetermining individuals' Medicaid eligibility beginning April 1, 2023.

What Does This Mean?

For the first time in three years, Medicaid recipients in Michigan must reapply for coverage starting April 1, 2023, or risk losing their coverage. The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) resumed conducting the annual renewal process on April 1, 2023, and notifications have started being sent to enrollees.

What Can You Do?

If you get questions from beneficiaries or know someone who may be affected by Medicaid redetermination:

- Remind them to make sure their address, phone number, and email address are up to date. Recipients must also report any changes to their household or income. The best way to update this information is online at [Michigan.gov/MIbridges](https://michigan.gov/MIbridges). They can also call their local MDHHS office. Visit the MDHHS County Office webpage to find local office information.
- If a qualified Medicaid recipient changed their contact information, they should also contact Meridian after reporting the change to the State to ensure that we can keep in contact. Beneficiaries can contact Meridian's Member Services at **888- 437-0606 (TTY: 711)**.
- Recipients should check mail or text messages received from MDHHS. If an eligibility renewal packet is received, complete it immediately and send it back to MDHHS.
- Beneficiaries can check their renewal month at newmibridges.michigan.gov. From June 2023-May 2024, people will get notification on a rolling basis about their three-month window to apply.

Vaccines for Children (VFC) Program

Information for Healthcare Providers

VFC will benefit your patients and your practice!

The VFC program provides all routine vaccines recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) at no cost to the participating healthcare provider.

Benefits of the VFC program

Being a VFC provider is a sound investment in your practice and patients. It reduces your up-front costs because you will not have to pay to purchase vaccines for VFC-eligible children. Also, you can charge an administrative fee to offset your costs of doing business. Your patients benefit because they won't have to go somewhere else to get the vaccines they need.

The VFC program will:

- Keep your patients in their medical home
- Reduce your up-front costs
- Help provide quality care to vulnerable children and adolescents

VFC Eligibility

Patients are eligible until they turn 19, if they meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Medicaid-eligible
- Uninsured

- American Indian or Alaska Native (AI/AN)
- Underinsured (Underinsured children can only be vaccinated at a Federally Qualified Health Center [FQHC] or Rural Health Center [RHC])

Becoming a VFC provider

You don't have to be a Medicaid provider to participate in VFC. Any healthcare provider authorized by their state to prescribe vaccines can be a VFC provider.

- Contact your state/local/territory VFC coordinator to request enrollment. You can find contact information at <https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/programs/vfc/state-vfc-websites.html>.
- Complete the State Provider Enrollment forms and return them as soon as possible.
- Once you have completed and returned enrollment forms, prepare for a site visit to go over the program's administrative requirements and proper storage and handling of vaccines.
